<p>communities in outbreak*</p> <p>*CMS defines outbreak as a 1+ positive case, CDPHE defines it as 2+</p>	<p>✓</p> <p>if testing is localized to a unit, this can apply to only those in that area</p>	<p>✓</p> <p>if testing is localized to a unit, this can apply to only those in that area</p>	<p>✓</p> <p>Visitors should be made aware of the potential risk of visiting during an outbreak investigation and adhere to the core principles of infection prevention. They may choose not to mask if 1:1 with the person they’re visiting, regardless of outbreak.</p>
<p>suspected/confirmed COVID infection or other respiratory illness symptoms</p>	<p>✓</p>	<p>✓</p>	<p>defer non-urgent in-person visitation until they meet CDC criteria for healthcare settings to end isolation</p>
<p>within 10 days of close contact exposure to a confirmed case</p>	<p>✓</p>	<p>✓</p> <p>incoming admissions and res. out for 24 hours</p>	<p>defer non-urgent in-person visitation until 10 days after their close contact</p>
